Michael's Musings

Herbert McCabe, writing in "A Sermon for Easter" (*God Still Matters*), pens: "We do not gather at Easter to celebrate a doctrine. We come here to rejoice in the presence of one we love; in Jesus who was lost to us and has been found." Indeed, we gather to worship at Easter not to celebrate by way of comparison – that we are more blessed because we believe in the unbelievable when the rest of the world can't or won't. No, we gather to share in the most profound transforming experience of our lives: The crucified one is now alive among us. As Pope John Paul II put it, "It is impossible for us to abandon ourselves to despair. We are the Easter people and hallelujah is our song!"

But it can be hard to sing, "hallelujah" when, if the truth be told, the resurrection we are really focused on is our lost Christian privilege. Somewhere along the line we replaced the experience of the Resurrected Christ among us with what I believe is now a particularly dangerous conviction: that God intended Christianity to be THE ONLY religion of the world. Thus, rather than being an attractive people of joy due to our experience of the Living Christ, we settle for being a people of subdued optimism due to our religious convictions.

Blaise Pascal once wrote, "Human beings never do evil so cheerfully as when they do it from religious conviction." Indeed, religious conviction without the experience of the Resurrected One blocks our capacity for self-criticism, destroys humility, and undermines the sense of oneness that should bind us together as one – not just with other Christians of conviction – but with all of humanity. It was religious conviction (divorced from the experience of the risen Christ) that inspired the Christian Crusades against Muslims and, centuries later, the Easter pogroms of Eastern Europe that led to the slaughter of Jews.


Here, I can't help but recall a William Sloan Coffin quote that I think about often, "I have become convinced that the more important question is not, 'Who believes in God?', but 'In whom does God believe?' Rather than claim God for our side, it's better to *wonder* whether we are on God's side." William Sloane Coffin, *Letters to a Young Doubter* (Westminster John Knox, 2005), 22-24. As a real disciple as opposed to a mere believer, one proclaims at Easter that one's *wonder* as doubt has been transformed by experience of the risen Christ into *wonder* as awe by way of the experience of the resurrected, crucified Christ. What could be more inviting that that?!


Property Improvements

Three Months in Mozambique: Research on Rural Local Government and a Family Trip to Africa

Trinity member Brian Norris received a Fulbright global scholar award to study rural local government in Mozambique for three months during the summer of 2024. This award allowed him to interview about 100 local government and civil society leaders in four rural sites in the country and for Jessica, Jo, Virginia, and Tabitha to join him for about six weeks.

Mozambique is one of the poorest countries in the world, and about 65% of its population lives in rural areas. Many rural areas lack adequate access to electricity, water, roads, healthcare, and education. Political scientists classify Mozambique's public administration as being in a phase of implementing "access reforms" designed to make basic services available for rural populations while countries such as Colombia have more or less achieved broad access to rural public services and are focused on improving the quality of these public services. While Mozambique is formally and in some ways substantively a constitutional democracy with universal suffrage, most rural Mozambicans do not elect their local officials. Mozambique is a post-conflict society that suffered a violent civil war between 1975 and 1990. My fieldwork revealed that while the Mozambican national government is strong enough to deny the vote to rural Mozambicans, its ability to provide basic public services is very weak. Many rural Mozambicans with whom I talked seemed increasingly fed up with the status quo. As the existential threats of the war fade from living memory, rural Mozambicans are facing a new set of challenges.

The backdrop to this research was a shared family experience that was irreplaceable. This was the family's second international trip, and it was neither Jessica's nor Brian's first rodeo. Nonetheless, the novelty of Africa and the very real logistical challenges of transporting the family to and caring for it within Mozambique were significant. Our time in Mozambique put us in contact with several groups, which quickly formed a sustaining community for us. Missionaries from Rolla, Missouri, of all places, showed us the ropes in Beira, the port city where we were based. Asima and Muniti, our neighbors, spoke the international languages of Legos and soccer, though they marveled at Jo, Virginia, and Tabitha's ability to throw a baseball. Jessica got to see an elephant in the wild, a deeply moving experience for her given her dedication of her career to environmental conservation. The Norris's came away from the experience with a deeper appreciation of their family unit, their blessings here in the US, and for the kindness and the peculiarities of the Mozambicans.

BOOK DISCUSSION OF TRANSFORMING – THE BIBLE & THE LIVES OF TRANSGENDER CHRISTIANS BY AUSTEN HARTKE

On Friday, May 10, 2024, we will be discussing the book, *TRANSFORMING*, by Austen Hartke, in the Fellowship Hall at Trinity Presbyterian Church, starting at 10:00 a.m., and ending at 11:30 a.m. This book is the third book selected in 2024 by the National Presbyterian Women Justice and Peace Book Discussion Group. *TRANSFORMING* addresses transgender issues and language and provides stories of both Biblical characters and real-life narratives from transgender Christians living today.
