Michael's Musings

October is the time of the year in the church when we celebrate the lifegiving goodness we know because of God's generosity. Our focus is on being faithful stewards of God's many gifts to us. This year's stewardship theme is *Life Giving*. The Scriptural focus is upon 1 Chronicles 29:14: "But who am I, and what is my people, that we should be able to make this free-will offering? For all things come from you, and of your own have we given you."

Although the books of Samuel/Kings and of Chronicles cover many of the same events in the history of Israel, Samuel/Kings was written around 550-560 BC during the Babylonian exile, while Chronicles was written after the exile was over, around 450-440 BC. Whereas Samuel/Kings addressed the hardhearted Israelites experiencing exile and captivity, Chronicles seeks to inspire hope and faith in God among those who are hurting after this spiritually devastating ordeal.

Thus, having just come through the pandemic of 2020-2022, the hopeful words of Chronicles seem appropriate as we look ahead to 2024 and a post-covid world. Hopeful people, people who move forward together with grace through difficult times are generous people and it is my observation that the people of Trinity are indeed hopeful, generous people. That is no small thing; for genuine hope lived out as generosity is as contagious as the coronavirus. With all of this in mind, your elected elders encourage all of us to prayerfully respond to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give back to God in 2024?"

We kick off our Stewardship Season this year on October 15. It will culminate at the end of worship on Dedication Sunday, October 29 at which time you will be asked to make your financial commitment to our church's ministries by bringing your pledge card forward to leave on the communion table. Following worship, we will have a celebration dinner in the fellowship hall. The Stewardship and Finance Committee will provide the meat, and members are asked to bring sides and a dessert. The pledge card will be mailed to you with a letter the week of October 16. When you turn in your pledge, our Administrative Assistant, Ann Bouchard, will be the only person to see that pledge. From then on, she will also be the only person with access to that information.

I thank you in advance for the prayerful consideration that you will give to engendering hope with your generosity as we look to the *Life Giving* spirit of the one who calls us together again in 2024.



The City of Refuge equips the refugees and immigrants arriving in our community with the supplies they need, as well as deeper friendships they can count on as they navigate a new life in the United States. Agencies Supported through Our Annual Budget



In honor of the City of Refuge: The Soup Supper is back! Join us on Sunday October 15th at 5 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall. We'll have plenty of comfort food and best of all we'll hear Dan Szy from the City of Refuge present their remarkable services that open opportunities for refugees and immigrants to successfully start new lives.

City of Refuge is one of the Missions that Trinity supports. This year they are the recipient of the Peace and Global Witness Special Offering, the Free Will Offering at the Soup Supper and a recipient of a donation from the Mission Committee.

Recently members of the Trinity's Evening Circle volunteered at the City of Refuge location and experienced sorting clothing, shoes and toy donations and arranging the items in a Basic Needs Room. We were delighted to see children immediately drawn to the toys we placed in the room, when they plopped down on the floor to play! All the items in the Basic Needs Rooms are available for free.

The City of Refuge serves 1,200+ people from 15 countries of origin. The largest groups are 37.8% Burmese, 24.6% Congolese, 19.0% Afghans, and 1.4%-3.4% are from Ukraine, Uganda, Iraq, Eritrea, and Burundi.

The City of Refuge focuses on three services: Basic Needs Fulfillment, Education and Professional Development. 150+ volunteers along with staff and interns provide the services. A Refugee Advisory Council meets every two months for both input and a means to distribute information.

Where is the City of Refuge located: 10 N. Garth Ave. across the street from the Columbia Public Library. At this location are free clothing, shoes, toys and basic essentials. A partnership with the Food Bank gives immediate access to food needs from their building. A Health Clinic was held in the Spring and they anticipate holding these clinics monthly beginning this Fall. Classes and information sessions include help navigating the public and private school systems, weekly Homework Helpers for K-8, a weekly "Youth Impact" group for High School students, twice a week Adult English Language learning classes led by volunteer instructors (volunteers and interns provide transportation and child-care for the classes) and typing classes held in their computer lab. The adults also learn how to apply for jobs and learn tangible marketable skills so that they can find work, support their families, and become successful members of our community.

In the North Garth complex, they anticipate opening a preschool in January 2024 where both refugee and non-refugee children can attend.

There are several ways the organization has developed avenues of income and free essentials for the refugees. At the Garth location is an attractive shop called City Boutique. There is a drive-up drop-off for donated small items that first go into the Basic Essentials rooms where the items are free for the refugees or are sold in the City Boutique. The Boutique's earnings go back into the refugee care and programs. With the shop's funding the Global Artisan program was started and the handcrafted items are available for purchase in the Boutique.

Trinity Library - Book Highlight

I Thought It Was Just Me (but it isn't): Making The Journey From "What Will People Think?" to "I Am Enough" by Brené Brown. "Shame corrodes the very part of us that believes we are capable of change." One of Brené Brown's favorite quotes. The first step of understanding shame is to define what it means to each of us.

Brown gives us shame resilience strategies and "points out that sometimes we are in the shame soup and need help and other times are the ones who can throw the life preserver to the person who is drowning." There are differences that separate us but in the end, we are more alike than different. We all want to feel valued, accepted, and affirmed. We feel shamed when we feel worthless and rejected. When we reach out to others, we learn that the experiences where we feel alone are actually universal experiences.

As you know, the libraries are in the process of being moved. Since there is increased organizational activity downstairs, the Children's Library book shelves are now temporarily located in the crib room. The adult library is still in the same space until further renovations can be done to the former front office space. Feel free to continue to check out books of interest.
