Michael's Musings

I have been reading "The MAGA Doctrine: The Only Ideas that Will Win the Future" by Charlie Kirk. It is a *New York Times* best seller and has been lifted up by former president Trump's base as his Magna Carta. The MAGA Doctrine serves as a blistering critique of what our republic has become. Kirk minces no words as he takes aim at both Democrats and Republicans.

I must say that I sympathize with the grievances outlined by Kirk: egregious government waste from politicians on both sides of the aisle who are out of touch with their electorate but seem to kowtow to every whim of the lobbyists of billionaires and large corporations. I am also in complete agreement with Kirk's assertion that the United States was founded on human freedom, a state of being that is above and beyond the ways we have tried to live it out in our democracy.

But where Kirk goes off the rails for me is in his advocacy for what can only be defined as absolute individual freedom without any real personal responsibility. Kirk's freedom includes giving the option to people of relying on the "common sense" of certain individuals over those who have dedicated their lives to studying a particular area. For instance, he advocates relying on the wisdom of one old farmer rather than agricultural experts about what might be best policies for land use in a particular area. (Most of my relatives are farmers and this idea terrifies me!).

There is, in fact, a virulent disdain by Kirk for the advice of learned experts, coupled with a dangerous naivete on his part regarding human sin – including how that sin is at the root of what he so confidently proclaims are the ONLY ideas that will win the future of the United States. Theologically, I understand freedom ultimately to be a spiritual state that can be reached regardless of outer circumstances – like the freedom exhibited by Nelson Mandela, imprisoned for 25 years in apartheid South Africa. However, Mandela was exceptional in this regard. Generally, we know there are human conditions more conducive to aiding people in experiencing this joyful state than imprisonment! Though imperfect, democracy appears to be the best among those conditions. It is a shame, as Kirk so aptly points out, that our system has degraded to the place where it has. But I do not see a fascist dictatorship – even by a benevolent leader who might appear to know what he or she is doing – as the answer. I am way too Presbyterian for that!

No, the answer is individuals, together in a democratic community, taking full responsibility for freedom – both their own and others'. With this God-given freedom, we need to continually find specific ways to practice the equanimity, compassion, and loving kindness of Christ every day – starting with those we love and moving out to include, yes, even our enemies.

Lenten Sermon Series Small Group Sundays February 18, 25, March 3, 10, & 24

Michael Stanfield will lead a Lenten study beginning Sunday, February 18 from 5:00-6:00 p.m. The group will meet 2/18, 2/25, 3/3, 3/10, & 3/24. The study will be based on the Sunday sermon. The first meeting will take place at Michael's home.

A "Brotherhood Fund" Story

In August/September 2022 and June/July 2023 the Brotherhood Fund helped assist an Iraqi family in Columbia whose baby had been born with birth defects that required a few weeks in NICU. They had to return to their home country for the father's work at the end of September 2022. They returned to the U.S. on June 30, 2023 for Cleft Palate Surgery combined with two other surgeries, multiple doctor visits, procedures and therapies. The father was again required to return to his home country for his job on September 29, 2023 and the mother, 12 year old daughter and baby had to remain for medical treatments and therapies.

On January 14, 2024 the mother and children began their return trip to Irag. The mother and children were under great pressure to pack up and leave and endure the very long flight that awaited them. Knowing that their apartment and all remaining supplies would be used to help others in similar situations was a huge relief for them and the husband who had to go much earlier to Iraq.

God helped them and protected them in many ways. After barely making their connecting flight in Dallas, due to weather delays, they missed their connecting flight in Qatar. Within the same time frame that they were to catch their connecting flight to Iraq, Iran was bombing sensitive sites in the city of Erbil where they were headed. All airports there were shut down. So the family was protected from even being on that flight as they may have been diverted to another city. After another 19 hours in Qatar, and struggling to find a hotel they finally reached their home safely. Now, another new chapter in their life begins.

Presbyterian Women Justice and Peace Book Discussion Group



On Friday, March 8, 2024, there will be a discussion of the book, *Our Missing Hearts*, by Celeste Ng, in the Fellowship Hall at Trinity starting at 10:00 a.m., and ending at 11:30 a.m. This book is the second book scheduled for the 2024 Presbyterian Women Justice and Peace Book Discussion Group. Our Missing Hearts is a fictional story about a 12 year old Chinese American boy living in the United States during a period of time when the government is controlled by PACT (the Preserving American Culture and Traditions Act) where Asian people are blamed for all of the problems in society. As a young child, Noah Gardner, nicknamed 'Bird' by his mother, experiences the disappearance of his mother, the demotion of his father, and shunning from his classmates and teachers at school. At age 12, Bird finds a note from his mother and decides to try to find her. We follow him as he and his father attempt to live their lives under the shadow of PACT and as he searches for his missing mother. There are multiple copies of the book available at Daniel

Boone Regional Library in several different formats – hard-bound, paperback, e-book, audiobook, large print, and audiobook CD. Participants are encouraged to read the book prior to the discussion so that they can participate fully in the conversation.

Property Improvements Campaign Update

Status of Projects

Work is now progressing fairly rapidly as we move toward the completion of the installation of the vertical platform lift and finishing work on the stairwell and Michael's former office. The old elevator will be removed soon and the upper and lower sections of the shaft converted to storage closets.

Fellowship Hall work will be completed very soon. With the installation of the new floor tile, the one thing that remains is having the painters return to do some touch up painting.

The kitchen work will begin when the stairwell work is done. The Design Team has chosen all the finishes, cabinets are ordered, the new dishwashers have been purchased as well as a new sink, disposal, and coffee maker (not originally planned, but the old one gave out).



Flooring in the expanded kitchen will be installed and walls painted before the new cabinets are set in place. The new kitchen will include storage space for larger items like coolers, roasters, etc. as well as space for Loaves and Fishes items, communion ware and supplies, and some staples for Sunday morning refreshments.

The former adult library will be painted very soon and the Children's Library items moved in there. This will be a space where parents with young children can go during worship and still be able to hear and see the service. The new adult library has been painted, new flooring installed, and shelving and books in place. There are still a few things to be completed, such as getting a table and chairs for smaller group meetings and getting the computer set up.

One of the sanctuary furnaces will be replaced soon. The old one had a couple of unrepairable problems and is no longer safe to operate.

Much of the new carpet has been installed. The replacement of existing carpet on the upper level by the bathrooms, entry, and hallway outside the kitchen will be the last thing to be done. We want to wait until all the construction is completed so we don't risk damage to the new flooring.

Status of Financing

Through the end of December, 2023, we were able to cover all project expenses with pledged donations. \$292,100 was pledged toward these projects; and as of December 31st, the church had received \$186,875 in pledged donations. We are hopeful that the receipt of additional pledged donations in the early part of 2024 will allow us to retain the additional funds designated by session for these projects in interest-bearing accounts for as long as possible.
