When Christmas Is Over . . .

The weekend of December 20-21, my husband, Chris, and I traveled to Kansas City to celebrate an early Christmas with our children and grandchildren, since this was an "in-law" year and we would not be with any of them on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day. After several hectic weeks of work at Trinity, I was looking forward to the weekend and finally having some time to spend with my family relaxing and experiencing the beauty and joy of the season. Saturday evening we all went out to eat, then enjoyed the Kansas City Symphony's Holiday Festival performance at the Kauffman Center. Sunday morning, our granddaughters opened our gifts to them, and we shared our family's traditional, Christmas morning breakfast. On Sunday afternoon, my KC daughter, two of my granddaughters and I ventured out to do some shopping. Our first stop was the nearby Home Goods store. When we walked in the front door, my senses were assaulted not by the expected Christmas décor, scents and gifts but rather by large, fully stocked displays for Valentine's Day! Christmas had already been replaced with Valentine's Day trinkets and cards, red boxes of candy, teddy bears with big hearts on them, red candles for romantic lighting, and lots of wooden signs and pillows bearing messages about "Love". And it was still 4 days until December 25th! What happened to Christmas?

Presbyterian Pastor John Walton writes, "Nothing is as over as Christmas when it's over. The empty boxes, the pretty paper on the floor, the stray tinsel from the tree with which the cat has played and left abandoned on the sofa, the empty cartons of eggnog stuffed into the trash bag. Life has come back to normal, whatever that is, and it means that the diversion of the past few weeks, the frenzy and fuss, the lights and glitter are packed away once again like the star at the top of the tree; taken down and carefully wrapped, padded and protected in its ample box. And what is left? Wars that still rage around the world, homeless people sleeping in door stoops, hungry people begging for food, worries about health, kids that concern us, jobs that wear us down. We're back to where we left off before the holiday . . . Like the folks who were left in town after the Lone Ranger had been for a visit, we may ask out loud, "Who was that masked man?" Or better said, "Who was that babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger?"

Over the weeks of Advent we listened to the prophecies of Isaiah. When the Messiah comes, Isaiah said, the world will have light and love and peace and joy. The faithful will sing in delight, for Immanuel, God with us, will be born. And he was born. And the world was forever changed. But what do we do now when the marketers tell us Christmas is over and the candles reminding us of the hope, peace, joy, and love promised by the prophet are packed away until the next Advent?

A recent devotional I read suggests we do these three things: 1) we trust God; 2) we take care of those we love; and 3) we remember the world to whom Christ came and for which he died. The author writes: "Christmas is centered in love. We must strive to keep the loving spirit of Christmas all year long, because the Christmas spirit consists of loving God and loving our neighbor not just one day of the year, but all the year round."

As I think about it now, perhaps I was a little harsh in my assessment of Home Goods marketing. Maybe I should have seen those red and pink hearts as reminders of the Love for which we were waiting and preparing, the Love that came to us that holy night and abides with us now. Love is the everlasting gift of Christmas that can be celebrated each and every day, regardless of the date on the calendar (or retailers' displays).

Esther Muench Plonk - Jim Muench's mother, on hospice

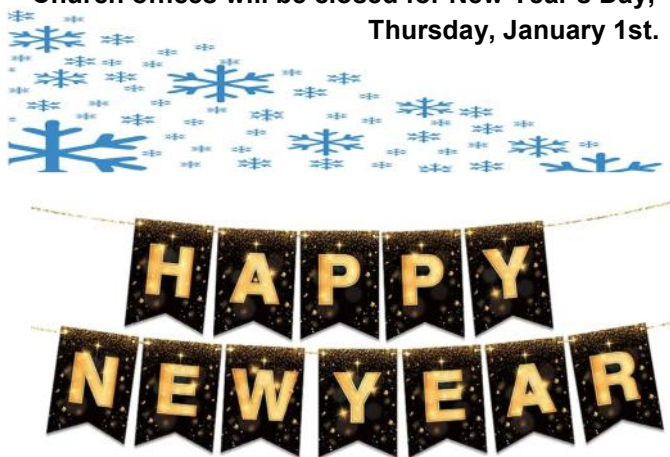


Year-End Financial Contributions

Trinity PNC Update

The Trinity Presbyterian Church Pastor Nominating Committee ("PNC") is happy to report that Trinity's Ministry Discernment Profile ("MDP") has been posted on the Church Leadership Connection ("CLC"), a denominational service that helps match potential pastor candidates to the congregation seeking a called pastor. This allows interested pastors to inquire and potentially submit their information to Trinity's PNC. In fact, within a day of posting the MDP with CLC, the PNC received matches through the CLC of potentially interested pastors. The next step is for the PNC to sort through the matches to identify those pastors from whom the PNC requests more information to review and to potentially interview potential applicants.

December Session Meeting Highlights



◆ New elders Brian Griffith, Cathy Nelson, and Marge Veum (Class of 2028) were examined after completing training with Rev. Osborn. Session approved the ordination of Elders Nelson and Veum and the installation of Elders Griffith, Bill Kennedy, and Susan Winkelmann on January 11, 2026. Elders Kennedy and Winkelmann are continuing on Session for one additional year.

- ◆ Session called the Annual Meeting of the Congregation for Sunday, February 1, immediately following worship. The Fellowship Committee will host a luncheon in conjunction with the meeting.
- ◆ Session approved removing from the active roll 18 individuals who no longer meet the criteria for active membership. Several of these individuals no longer reside in or near Columbia. A few other members will be contacted to discern whether they wish to remain on the active roll and to invite them to return to participation in church events.
- ◆ Pastor Nominating Committee member Brian Griffith updated Session on the committee's work. The PNC has received 25 applications through the Church Leadership Connection referral system. The committee is closely reviewing each applicant's information. Additional referrals are expected, and the committee will meet next on December 29.
- ◆ Elder Newkirk reported that eleven small Christmas trees were decorated and delivered to some Trinity members along with handmade Christmas cards the first weekend in December. Recipients have expressed deep gratitude for these gifts.
- ◆ A 2026 Operating Budget of \$422,785 was approved by Session. Next year's budget includes funding for both Rev. Osborn's continuing service to Trinity as well as for a new, installed pastor, including search and moving expenses. Anticipated operating expenses may change depending on when an installed pastor begins his or her ministry here.
- ◆ Elder Neely joyfully reported that Trinity had recently received a \$25,000 gift for the new Legacy Fund. The Stewardship and Finance Committees will be working on a new Memorial Fund Policy and a Financial Review Policy in 2026. The committee also approved taking the full 4% distribution in 2026 from the February 15 Endowment Fund. This will total approximately \$4,000. The Stewardship and Finance Committee will review uses for the February 15 funds.



Trinity has 2 excellent libraries—one for children and one for adults. Check out a book from either or both the next time you're at church. The children's library is adjacent to the sanctuary, and the adult library is across from the kitchen.

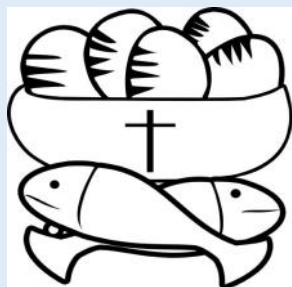
