Pentecost – What does it mean?

The easy answer many give is that "it's the birthday of the church." But the day is much more interesting — and riskier — than that. Because Pentecost is a time for Christians to be reminded that we're called to be a bunch of dreamers. All of us are, whether we prefer to worship sitting on our hands, or at our sides, or with a little more movement and feeling.

I'm not talking about individual "dreamers" who insist they speak for God or have "got a gift". I'm talking about communities of faith that discover they — *together* — can be a vehicle for showing God's vision for the world.

In our faith tradition, Pentecost brings the 50-day Easter season to a close. But it also points forward toward new beginnings. For it's a time when we followers of Jesus celebrate the coming of His Holy Spirit and the new possibilities this opens up for us to continue the mission and ministry of the Risen One.

When the Acts of the Apostles (in chapter 2) describes the imparting of the Holy Spirit upon Jesus' followers on Pentecost, dreams and visionary experiences are part of the discussion. I know as "decently and in order" Presbyterians, these details make many of us nervous. But they should also make us expectant, eager to play a part in the emergence of God's hopes and dreams for us, for our church, and God's world.

The story in Acts goes like this: The Holy Spirit fills Jesus' followers and they begin speaking about "God's deeds of power" in other languages, which people visiting Jerusalem from regions all around recognize as their native tongues. The confused crowd asks, "What does this mean?"

Everything that follows in Acts 2 attempts to answer their question. And Paul begins to answer that question by quoting Joel, telling them that the faithful will prophesy, will see visions, and have dreams.

Words like "prophecy" and "visions" may make you think of wild-eyed doomsayers distributing leaflets in downtown Columbia or those late-night commercials promoting the Psychic Friends Network. But Pentecost isn't about that kind of prophecy. You see, Peter isn't saying God's Spirit gives people ability to see clearly into the future. He's telling us that the Spirit comes to us to help us make sense of the present. And that's what Paul does in the Book of Acts, explaining what God is making possible in the here and now, naming places and ways in which God is active or visible in the world with the coming of Christ's Spirit.

And the good news for Trinity Presbyterian Church is this is exactly what we are doing during this time of discernment and mission study, asking the Spirit to help us make sense of the present and to discover how Christ is active in our community and in our world so that we can join Him in whatever mission and ministry that might be.

So, may this Pentecost and time of discernment be an invitation for TPC to dream. To dream of what is possible. For when a community of faith quits dreaming dreams, it has little to offer either its members or the wider world.

I pray you join us June 8th as we celebrate Pentecost and discover what does Christ's Spirit coming to us at Trinity mean for us? **Don't forget to wear red!**

Pentecost Special Offering

At-risk children, youth and young adults are supported by the church's Pentecost Offering. This year the Mission and Outreach committee selected Rooted 242 to receive the 40% of the Offering that stays in our local community area. Rooted 242 is a nonprofit organization located in downtown Moberly dedicated to empowering youth aging out of foster care and supporting families impacted by the foster care system. After aging out of foster care, in Missouri, 18% experience homelessness by age 19 with that increasing to 29% by age 21. Rooted 242 provides supportive housing to help youth reach independence and self-sufficiency. Finding these youth hard to employ because they lack job skills and experience, Rooted 242 has a café with a nontoxic work environment that provides a training ground for the youth to get experience in food service and hospitality services. High rates of mental health issues, including PTSD and depression are

prevalent among former foster youth. Rooted 242 also collaborates with existing services, community events and support groups to create a nurturing environment for the youth. Your donations can make a big difference for the youth served by Rooted 242.

Highlights from the April Stated Session Meeting

Trinity's session met on Tuesday evening, May 20, for their monthly, stated meeting.

- •Session received Jim West's resignation as Organist with deep regret.
- The Property Committee is exploring options for replacing the exterior Fellowship Hall surface. Birds have opened holes in the front and back walls and are nesting there. Several bids are being sought for a concrete siding which would have a similar look to the current façade and keep the birds from returning.
- The committee is also seeking quotes for church insurance. The current carrier is doubling the premium for the next policy year.
- Ark Virkler repaired the concrete ramp from the parking lot to the Fellowship Hall west door.
- The Stewardship and Finance Committee submitted a "Purchasing Policy and Procedures" document for first reading.
- The sacrament of Holy Communion will be celebrated on Sunday, June 8. Guest preachers will be needed for Sundays, July 6 and July 27, when Rev. Osborn is on vacation.
- The Worship Committee will explore new procedures for offering communion to homebound members.
- David and Shioko Shimomura were removed from the active roll; all contact has been lost with them since they left Columbia.
- The wedding of Anntoine Hughes and Tarmarke S. Jenkins (non-members) was approved for Saturday, April 24, 2026. Anntoine is the daughter of Maria Dawson and the late Rev. Dr. C. W. Dawson.
- Session discussed the building use request from CoMo Estás, a new Spanish language program for children. Como Estás is a for-profit organization, and at the present time, there are concerns about the possible impact on Trinity's non-profit status if the church rents space to a for-profit organization.

This collection brings together work of many of the leading composers of contemporary psalm settings.
